COMPONENT 1 — Languages and Communication

- A. Choose **ONE** of the following three options:
 - 1. International language course offered by your school (full credit 110 hours)
 - 2. International language course offered through OCDSB's International Languages Program
 - 3. International language learning experience (including language apps) approved by the ICP Advisor and the International Education Coordinator
- **B.** Complete the 4 hour **Intercultural Communication and Awareness Workshop** which helps you to understand and appreciate the complexities of culture and to develop cultural competencies.

For students who are **newcomers to Canada** during their high school years, any language credits in **ESL, ELD, FSL** and **IL** will be considered.

Honours Option:

If you obtain **TWO** credits in a language **other than** English or French **OR ONE** additional credit in **another international language**, you may qualify for an Honours designation on your Certificate.

COMPONENT 2 — International Coursework

A. Take any **FOUR** provincially accredited full credit courses that have a specified international focus. Courses may include, but are not limited to:

Other credit courses, including **Co-op** and/or **Link Crew** with an **international** or **intercultural** focus, may be eligible with **prior approval**.

B. Students will be required to adapt any project or assignment in any **TWO other courses** between Grades 9 and 12. Before starting, speak with your teacher about how you can take a specific international, intercultural or global perspective on the assignment or project.

Course availability may vary by school. A maximum of 2 arts courses may be counted. Courses used to fulfill the international language component will not count as one of the four senior credits; however, a second international language course may count.

COMPONENT 3 — International Experience & Engagement

This component requires you to commit to international experiences and engagements of at least 100 hours (locally, abroad, online or a combination thereof) between Grades 9 and 12.

100 hours (Honours - 150 hours)

Possibilities include:

- A **long-term** international student exchange or study abroad program. More options can be found on our <u>website</u>
- International travel though school-approved trips or family travel that has a specific international learning focus
- Participating in local community or non-governmental organizations that deal with international initiatives (WaterCan, MedLife, Buy-A-Net, Right to Play Canada, etc.)
- Active involvement in your school's clubs with an international focus (Multicultural Club, Diversity Club, Model UN, Environmental Club, Global Citizen Club, Volunteer Club, etc.)
- Mentoring an international newcomer to your school, including hosting an international student in your home. More details at <u>www.canadahomestaynetwork.ca</u>
- Participating in local cultural events and activities (summertime cultural festivals, film festivals, Asian street food market, art gallery exhibit, embassy-led events, etc.)
- Online cultural explorations shared by the International Education Coordinator

Other opportunities will be considered with approval of the International Education Coordinator. For students on school-approved trips, the maximum number of hours credited will be **8 hours per day**.

Honours Option: If you obtain more than the minimum time commitments for the International Experience and Engagement, you may qualify for an Honours designation on your Certificate. **Diversity of experience** must be demonstrated. For example, you cannot complete all of your hours with one club or one single experience.



This final step provides evidence that you have completed all of the requirements in order to be presented with the OCDSB International Certificate. After meeting with your school's ICP advisor to ensure that all components have been completed and that the ICP database has been accurately updated, you may start your Final Reflection.

Final Reflection

This task showcases your achievements and synthesizes your learning and experience in a way that suits your individual interests and skills. Choices may include a written reflection, video, slideshow, presentation or artistic creation.

Your reflection must highlight:

- what you've learned and discovered about yourself, the world and others as you've journeyed through the ICP;
- how you've grown as a global citizen and why that is important in today's world;
- how each component influenced your thinking about international issues and global citizenship.

The OCDSB's International Certificate Program is designed to recognize and honour students in grade 9-12 who demonstrate a commitment to being motivated, engaged and active global citizens. There are no prerequisites and students may join in any grade. Pre-approval is necessary for students joining in grade 12.
