## ORANGE SHIRT DAY

### September 30, National Day of Truth and Reconciliation

This day recognizes the Indigenous children who attended residential schools who never returned home, and the survivors who suffered physical, mental, and sexual abuse while students at these residential schools that had an aim of robbing Indigenous peoples of their traditional culture. Over 150,000 children attended these schools; the last of these schools closed in 1997. One way Canadians recognize the traumatic impact of the residential schools is to wear an orange T-shirt, often with the words "Every Child Matters" on the front. This day is an opportunity for all Canadians to learn the truth about residential schools and to work towards reconciliation.
